

GRIDLOCK:

CITIES, STRUCTURES, SPACES 21 AUGUST - 17 OCTOBER 2004

The Govett-Brewster Art Gallery presents Gridlock: cities, structures, spaces the latest in a series of thematic exhibitions that include Drive: power, progress, desire 2000, Extended Play: art remixing music 2003, and Bloom: mutation, toxicity and the sublime 2003. The exhibitions in this series interpret the response of artists to prescient and problematic developments in contemporary culture. Gridlock presents work by 16 leading artists who explore the implications and impact of architecture, urban planning, and their representation in popular media on contemporary art and the conduct of daily life.

Gridlock takes its title from trafficjams that are endemic in large cities around the world; particularly infamous in Auckland and Los Angeles. Gridlocked traffic is a product of the system it disrupts. And the artists in the exhibition also disrupt the architectural grid in different ways.

In the early-20th century the grid folded into the fabric of building and became a controlling principle of modernist architecture, that later folded into art and cinema. This produced a seamless relationship between building, planning, and painting and recto-linearity became a totalising affect of the century. The eponymous examples of this are the buildings of Mies Van der Rohe and the painting of Piet Mondrian,

most famously **Broadway boogie** woogie 1942-1943.

Despite recent 'sculptural' shifts in architecture represented by the work of Frank O. Gehry and Santiago Calatrava the grid remains the dominant organising principle of architecture: think of Sir Norman Foster's world's tallest building currently being constructed in Shanghai. The grid has also reasserted itself in contemporary art

particularly in recent work made

by artists interested in mapping the social dimension of space, namely its function. For example artists such as Luca Frei, Liam Gillick, and Jorge Pardo who make exhibition display systems or installation that crosses over with gallery furniture — a link can be made here between conceptual minimalism and the clean lines of modernist design. These artists reiterate the grid as much as they reveal it.

The return of the grid as a formal art and architectural principle and metaphor, is reflective of the 'permanence' of architecture and the inexhaustibility of modernism. The scale of building (especially towers) ensures a memorial imprint and produces a sense of buildings watching over us. In the collective unconscious building is forever (this concept amplified the psychic shock of the destruction of the Twin Towers).

Despite the often overwhelming nature of buildings and cities a number of the **Gridlock** artists reveal their underpinnings in subtle ways.

As the sole venue for this exciting thematic exhibition, the Govett-Brewster Art Gallery provides its audience with the opportunity to experience the latest international contemporary art and the diverse ways in which artists are addressing a range of issues related to architecture and urban design that impacts on society at large.

Finnish collaborative-duo OLO produce site-specific sculptures and architectural interventions. At the Govett-Brewster they are constructing a public sauna from found materials (polythene, timber off-cuts, tarpaulin).



Saunas, which are an integral element of the Nordic lifestyle, challenge perceptions of social space when deployed in public in other parts of the world where taboos of nudity exist.

Operating during the opening weekend the visiting audience is invited to use the sauna and participate in a Fluxus style event.
