AN EXHIBITION OF TARANAKI ART SOCIETIES AND INDEPENDENT ARTISTS 1973

30 AUGUST — 16 SEPTEMBER 1973

INTRODUCTION

An exhibition of Taranaki Art Societies and Independent Artists 1973 is the fourth exhibition of its type at the Govett-Brewster Art Gallery. Each year a selection panel has the imponderable task of carving out an exhibition from entries submitted by artists, both professional and amateur, living and working in Taranaki. This year the task fell to Mr. Ian Hunter, Mr. Tom Kriesler and myself. Out of 329 entries the selectors were able to choose 107 works, which they unanimously feel is a quality exhibition. The entries this year were of an exceptional calibre and it was difficult to trim the works to one third of the total entered. However, those included in the exhibition have qualities over and above those rejected.

The process may be of some interest, both to the artists who entered work and to the viewing public. The first process consisted of the selectors viewing all the entries and eliminating those works which were of an obviously inferior nature. One vote kept a work in. The remaining works were then viewed again with a better understanding of the contextual situation. Three sections were made: rejects, possibles and accepted. The possible section was viewed again and works were either rejected or accepted. Two votes kept a work in. The selectors then went through the accepted section rejecting approximately 10-15 more works which they felt did not come up to the quality of the exhibition that was forthcoming. A last and final cutting was made and the exhibits were arranged into three separate groups which appear in the catalogue. The first group includes

works which all three selectors felt had outstanding merits, over and above the other exhibits. The second group represents works that all three selectors agreed on and the third group contains works which received one dissenting vote. It was felt that by dividing the entries into three sections the artists and the public could better evaluate the selectors decisions and see, with a little more depth, how they arrived at the final exhibition. The selection took approximately six hours.

All three selectors felt a deep sense of accomplishment and wished to underline their opinion that this exhibition is of a very high standard. There were, however, a number of works which were rejected because of a lack of co-ordination between an idea and its completion, due to either ignorance of materials and techniques or an insufficient understanding of purpose. However, the selectors felt that the rejection of a work was not for the purpose of discouraging an artist but to encourage him or her to come to grips with the completion of an idea or vision. The worth of this particular process is being proven in the present exhibition. The standard has grown. This year there were 30 entries over last years response and 30 additional accepted entries. The acceptance of additional entries is not to be misconstrued as a slacking of selection standards, the improvement of entries was obvious.
